Nost of the membership are probably aware that, under the terms of the interest-free losn negotiated with Rayments, the Club is basically tied to this brewery for its beer supplies. This means that we can obtain the selection of draught beers listed in the table

Out of nine draught beens available from the brewery the club at present stocks six. Of the remaining three AA Abbot is basically the original cask form of Keg Abbot and therefore the only two practical additions to our range are Kronenbourg lager and draught Guiness. rouge tol paideom (1919199 A

For those of you interested in figures I have given the volumes of the beers already stocked that the club bought in May this year. Clearly our two Cask beers (or Real Ales) KK and BBA are the most popular beers-28% and 26% of sales respectively with Lager running a fairly close third with 24% of sales. This means that although the club follows national trends with Lager sales we are somewhat unique in our high consumption rate of Mild.

At our recent AGM, I was elected to succeed Bob Jones as
Secretary and I now find myself in something of a quandry.
How do you follow someone like the 'Mr Chess' of PERME?
As is so often the case, Bob agreed to take on the job 'just for one season untill you find someone else'. That was way back in 1959 and it is only now, with his retirement from PERME, that 'someone else' has been unearthed. Bob will, of course, continue to play for the Club and retains the arduous task of organising our Correspondence Chess teams.

My own fondest memory of Bob is my first meeting with him. I had been at PERME just two days when he approached me and almost joyfully announced: 'I hear that you play Chess'.
I am still trying to find out how he knew this - perhaps all PERME newcomers are vetted for a Chess background!

To mark his 22 years as Secretary, Bob was presented with an engraved Chess board and set by our members.

On the playing side, the Club's major achievement of the season (or of any previous season!) has been our <u>First Team</u> winning the Final of the National Club Championship Plate against Stevenage It seems ironic after away matches with clubs like Bradford and Pontypool, that the Final should turn out to be a local Derby!

In the North Circular League 'A' Division, the side finished level on points with Waltham Forest at the top of the table but board count will, we fear, place us in second spot.

It was disappointing not to retain the Herts Team Championship for the Pullar Cup, especially as we fielded what appeared to be a stronger side than last year. In the Lawrance Cup, we reached the semi-final but were then defeated by Waltham Forest.

The Second Team, by finishing 5th in the North Circular League 'B' Division, improved three places on last season. This was a creditable performance after a year in which some stronger players were not always available.

The Essex League side gained promotion from Division 3 to Division 2 by finishing as runners-up. After a poor start to the season, a run of six wins and a draw from the last seven matches clinched this high position.

The Essex Commercial League side, captained by Bob Terry, dropped only one point all season and deservedly won the League title.

Individual performances: Pride of place here must go to Paul Byway who has qualified for the British Championships.

The Final of the Kirby Cup - a competition for the Individual Championship of the North Circular League - ended up an all PERME affair, with John Cook beating Terry Turner. Both are former holders of the trophy.

Andrew Cooper captained the Herts County side which also contained PERME'S Paul Byway (top board) and John Cook, whilst Terry Turner was a regular on Board 2 for his county of birth, Norfolk.

Club Championship: The individual Club Champion is again John Cook with a magnificent score of $7\frac{1}{2}$ points from 8 games. The Handicap Section was won by Bob Jones, who scraped home by just half a point from Grant Privett.

We have welcomed several new members over the past year but are always on the look-out for Chess players - don't be put off if you are just a beginner (or even a Grandmaster). If you are the former, we can help you - if the latter, then you can help us! Please contact either John Cook (our Chairman) on ext. 238 or myself on ext. 312, or come along to the Club on any evening throughout the Summer.
