THE LONDON MARATHON

I wish to convey my thanks to all those who sponsored me in the London Marathon and in particular to ticket sellers including Doreen Bird, Fay Cook, Ian Griggs, Eileen Henshaw, Diane Howse, Sue Morgan, Peter Eickhoff and Ted O'Day. The prize draw takes place on 13th June so I hope some of you are successful. The total raised for the Muscular Dystrophy Research Group was £224-20. This alone would make the effort involved and the many months of training worthwhile but as a bonus I achieved a personal goal in terms of finishing time. I "breezed" under the digital clock in 2h 58m Ols thus beating the 3h barrier with something to spare, despite the strong winds. This compares with my previous personal best for a marathon of 3h 10m 29s at Wolverhampton in March. Over-ambition led me to wear lightweight racing shoes which provide relatively little cushioning and thus blisters became a problem very early on. From about 4 miles onwards my feet caused severe discomfort but fortunately my legs held out well and I didn't encounter the energy problem at all. The only problem en route was just past the halfway mark to give my 4 year old daughter a kiss. I later regretted this since my finishing time was 4 seconds longer than my elder brother's personal best- one lives and learns! The euphoria on finishing is such that I was out training the following lunchtime and I shall be back (computer selection willing) next year - not least for another kiss from the pretty girl who draped the medal around my neck. Anyway, with the East London Half Marathon on May 27th and four more marathons planned this year I had better get out on the road and clock up some miles!

In the POSTAL HISTORY CLASS his entry "Postal Shortages in German Occupied Guernsey 1940/45" was awarded the N.M.JONES CUP and he won the FOUNDER'S SHIELD in the GENERAL GB CLASS for "The 1942 Jersey ½d Arms Stamp". Both entries won their respective classes and both obtained judge's markings of 85% which also earned each entry a gold standard certificate. Only 3 golds were awarded altogether.

The judge's main problem was to decide which entry would be awarded the CIVIL SERVICE PHILATELIC SOCIETY CHALLENGE TROPHY as the best entry in the whole competition and this was eventually awarded to the "Jersey" entry. This entry has now been submitted into the Essex County Competition to be held next month in Romford. Ian is then hoping to expand it from its present 9 sheets up to 15 and enter it in National (and hopefully International) competition later in the year.



RARDE RULES AND LABORATORY PROCEDURES FOR CHEMISTS

CHEMICAL AND SOLVENT HANDLING:
