

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CHAIRMAN'S CHAT

The changing of our name to the POWDERMILL CLUB has taken longer than expected and at present we have the confused situation where both names are in use. It would have been nice to have had a sharp transition but the problem is effecting this with the many external agencies we have dealings with. However once we start banking in our new name our former title will be finally laid to rest.

The future status of the club remains unresolved and discussion continues at a high level between Establishments and Headquarters. The ROF side did attempt to secure ownership of the Club and the Conference Centre but this is being strongly resisted by MGD it appears likely that the Club will remain under MOD ownership. In either case our situation is further complicated by the stated intention of the ROFs as a whole to secode from the affiliation with PESSA and CSSC and set up its own recreational association. The ROF plan contains some attractive financial proposals which would benefit many of the individual clubs, particularly those which are less successful than ours. However there is a string attached - to instal a Factory Accountant or equivalent representative onto the club committee as a Financial Monitor and Controller. Personally I would deplore this intrusion into the autonomy and democracy of the Club. The ROF secession will have an important effect on individual ROF members since, come "vesting day" their subscriptions from salary to the CSSC will cease and the Club shall no longer receive the rebated income which comprises the membership fee to the Club. This means that we shall have to arrange a new method of obtaining the membership subscription from RDF members. Hopefully we will be able to get you to sign a new mandate authorising the equivalent deduction from salary which can be paid directly to the Club instead of to the CSSC.


DARTS COMPETITIONS


