It's time to put on my Scrooge hat again and report the now customary annual round of increases from the Brewery, putting 3-5p on to the price of a pint, depending on gravity. (An extremely grave situation indeed. Ed.) I guess people are becoming immune to such increases as I did not hear very many moans and groans this year.

I was interested to read a recent newspaper survey concerning the variation in beer prices around the country. I noticed this myself the other week while staying in the Preston area. A lovely pint of Burtonwood or Tetleys up there cost me 60-64p, some 20p cheaper than the equivalent pint in London or Waltham Abbey. The difference in selling price becomes even more striking if the excise duty (20p) is deducted from each figure. One can accept argument for a small surcharge in places like Central London but surely not for outlying areas and country villages which are not all that different from other parts of the country. In my view it is a rip-off by the brewers which has gradually evolved and will be very difficult to correct; but all power to any campaign seeking a fairer national pricing policy.

From the various Guest Beers we have tried over the last six months I have selected Marston's Pedigree as one of the best available to us and we are now giving it an extended run to see if it will build up a regular trade.

Now I shall start bracing myself for yet another Xmas onslaught. Xmas Eve and New Year's Eve will be exceptionally busy nights for the Bar and I am grateful to the staff willing to work on these evenings.

OCTOBER 9th. Against Cakebread-Robey we lost by 6 games to 5. Our opponents were men so I thought it was a good result.


