CHAIRMAN'S CHAT

As expected the Xmas period proved to be a busy and successful one for the Club and we have now settled back to a less hectic routine. I would predict that the AGM in May will reveal a very good year overall. One reason for this has been increased fruit machine income since the present machine is very popular and has not been plagued by breakdowns and we have recently added a new, smaller jackpot machine which is also boosting our income. Another factor is the new Royal Ordnance membership system whereby we receive a matching employers contribution. This will provide us with a new and significant revenue. However it will not prove difficult to spend our surplus. It is intended to resurface the tennis courts this year and although this will be a considerable expenditure it can be considered as a useful investment for the next five to ten years. We are also considering redecorating the Club lounge this year.

The latest position on the Club's staus vis-a-vis RO and MOD is that proposals have been generally agreed whereby RO will assume responsibility for the Club but MOD will retain ownership of the building and land. Detailed discussions are to be convened soon. At this stage it seems that the new set up could have two main disadvantages. Firstly, we may be required to pay the heating and the lighting costs and secondly the present casual use of the main hall by the Club may no longer be possible - we may have to pay to use it! For my part I shall be seeking to secure an arrangement that is as painless as possible for the Club,


