


RARDE WALTHAM ABBEY BICENTENARY

Just in case you hadn't heard, the North Site is celebrating its Bicentenary. Two hundred years ago the existing Gunpowder Mills were nationalised and the Site has been in Government hands ever since.

As part of the celebrations a FAMILIES OPEN DAY was held on Saturday 12th September and I thought "So What. What's there to see on North Site?", but then I thought "A 'nostalgic stroll around the old place might be interesting". I obviously wasn't alone in this since, on the day apparently, over 1000 people attended including employees past and present from both RARDE and RO Waltham Abbey, their families, and their friends. As it turned out, it was well worth going to. In addition to the scientific exhibits in various labs there was an historical display in the library and some special exhibits by the Royal Navy and commercial Defence Contractors. There were also trips to the Burning Ground and Newton's Pool where underwater explosions were carried out. I didn't manage to get to go on the Burning Ground demo but I'm told that it was well worth seeing. The Newton's Pool demo was really great!

Special displays were organised for the afternoon starting with a Brass Band Concert by WARE BRASS near the Main Gate. It was a bit wet and blustery to sit and listen but it gave just the right atmosphere to the proceedings. After that was a display by the local Fire Brigade who simulated two crashed cars on fire and carried out a rescue exercise. They also staged a static exhibition in conjunction with the RO internal Fire Brigade. This was followed by a demonstration drill of an FH70 Mobile Gun by the Royal Artillery- most impressive! For me, one of the main highlights of the Day was the military pyrotechnics display on the Long Walk with demonstrations of Smokes, Flares and Bangs. This started off with a gunpowder explosion and culminated in the setting off of 200 Thunderflashes, one for each year of the Bicentenary. I enjoyed that very much although I couldn't hear of the accompanying commentary because of the high winds. I just had time after that to dash along to the Main Hall for a quick pint and browse around the Souvenir Stall. Some of the souvenirs were well worth buying, and I'm told there are some left. I bought a tie and a couple of mugs. I also bought a balloon for the Balloon Race, and with the high winds I expect that the eventual winner could even be from as far away as Russia! I said I had to dash into the Hall for a quick drink because I didn't want to miss the Dog Display by our very own Ministry of Defence Police. This display was really great and I enjoyed seeing the dogs putting their handlers through their paces! Seriously though, this was another event worth seeing. I stayed on to the bitter end, well at least until the Bar closed (the end of the Bitter?!), and watched the Tree Planting Ceremony at the close of the afternoon. The RARDE Director's wife planted a Copper Birch in commemoration of the Bicentenary- I hope it lasts!

BICENTENARY FIREWORKS & BBQ
