Dear Miss Dean

COLONEL F T FISHER

I am afraid we have very little to offer on the subject of Colonel Fisher, except for the enclosed photograph taken during his period of office as Superintendent of the RGPF.

No obituary is available from **eighter** The Times or the <u>RA Journal</u>. However, you could consult the Waltham Abbey and Sevenoaks Press (When he died, on 15 May 1938, Fisher lived at Rocklands, Granville Road, Sevenoaks, Kent).

Details from <u>Who Was Who</u> show that Fisher was born on 17 January 1863; his father being <u>W R Fisher</u>, a barrister at <u>Lincoln's Inn.</u> He was schooled at Harrow and the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich. In the Royal Artillery from 1882 to 1913, he became Colonel substantive in 1913. Posts of authority held include Superintendent of the Royal Arsenal 1901-7; Superintendent of Experiments, Shoeburyness, 1908-9; and Superintendent of the RGPF Waltham Abbey and RSAF Enfield Lock 1909-17.

This 'Establishment' background is very much reflected in the man who signed the 1909-10 RGPF annual report and regretted the loss of boy labour for purely economic reasons (photocopy enclosed). He was not a reformer!

We cannsee this military mind at work behind reorganisation of procedures at the RSAF, detailed in the annual report of the RSAF for the same year. There is much mention of "economy" and "costs". An improvement in the booking of piece work, involver "the formation of a central card section" which was to be "staffed by book-keepers drawn from the Factory", and not replaced". Altogether an efficient holder of the post of Superintendent.

I hope this information will be helpful to you. Apart from an approach to the Sevenoaks and Waltham Abbey Press, I can only suggest that you might gather more details from an approach to the Library of the Royal Artillery Institution, Royal Military Academy, Academy Road, London, SE18 4DN (Tel: 01-856 5533 Ext 2523).
