I understand that the quality of the copies is very low but can be improved upon. The Site (which is fenced) was only entered after a failed attempt to contact the local Gardo and confirmation had been obtained from the local garrison that entry was acceptable to the authorities. Indeed these actions were not required as during our visit we learned that a number of the locals exercise their doys at the site

and that the sencing was believed to be there to prevent small children Straying into the area. The first few photographs show the general location with Nº7 being of the wall beside the river. The photographs thereafter are of the remains which as you can see, are conscolerably overgrown, Regrettably the demands of the rest of the family to return to more hobilay-like pass-times prevented a more detailed inspection,
