Animal care campaign

THE British Union for the Abolition of Vivisection, supported by Epping Forest Animal Welfare, has launched its "choose cruelty-free" campaign.

The group claims, 17,000 animals die in painful experiments each year.

Local campaign co-ordinator, Bruce Wiseman said: "Not only are these tests cruel but they are also unscientific and inaccurate."

Members of the group will be distributing leaflets on products available which are not tested on animals.

And Mr Wiseman will be writing to Epping supermarket manager Antony Stead asking if he will support the ideal of Tesco's stocking cruelty-free products.

A Tesco spokesman said: "Most of our products are within the cruelty-free guidelines but we are always mindful of public opinion on this sensitive issue."

History of gunpower

AN exhibition with a "bang" opened at Epping Forest Museum, Waltham Abbey, on Tuesday.

Titled A Gunpowder Plot, the exhibition celebrates 200 years of activity on the site of RARDE, the Royal Armament Research and Development Establishment, which, in the 18th century, was a privately owned gunpowder

mill, and is now a Government research establishment.

The site has been a part of the lives of Waltham Abbey people and the exhibition, which is on loan to the museum, has been created by RARDE to celebrate the bicentenary of the purchase of the powder mills by the Crown.

The displays include historical items and videos on

RARDE's experimental work for the Government.

The exhibition last until Sunday, January 31, and the museum is open Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays and Mondays from 2pm to 5pm and on Tuesday from noon to 5pm. Admission is free.

The building will be closed from December 25 to 29, and on January 1.



Tree for local radio garden
