Sir,

You will make use of the following Proportion of Ingredients in the Gunpowder which you Manufacture at Waltham Abbey until further Orders.

Wt. / lb.

Salt Petre	75.
Sulphur	10.
Charcoal	15.
	100.

You are to form your Powder from Cake and Dust of the Mill Charges Pressed together a sufficient time to bring it into a firm Body - The Dust which is produced from forming this first Powder (called the first Dust,) after having the fine Grain Separated from it, is also to be Pressed & formed, of its Dust. (called the second Dust,) after having the fine Grain separated therefrom, is to be Pressed & formed. Great Care must be taken that both Dusts are Pressed sufficiently firm to prevent the Powder from being of a rotten Grain. The remains of Dust after working the second Dust into Gunpowder is to have the fine Grain Separated from it. If it then to be sent to a Mill to be Worked one Hour. If a Half - You must be particularly careful that the several Ingredients are Pulverized as near as possible to the same degree of fineness. They are to be put into a large Tub in alternate layers - to be well blended with a Spatier. & then to be pressed thro' a fine wire sieve to make

as Intimate a Mixtare as possible - Your Charges of Green Composition are never to be worked less than three Hours, exclusive of the time required to load. You unload the Mills, & as much longer as you may find it necessary, from time to time to bring it into a proper state. After the Powder is formed, it is to be Moderately Glazed, It is then to be Stove Dried with such a degree of Heat, that the Thermometer in the Door of the Stove may not be less than 90 degrees when the Stove is at the hottest - The Powder is never to be Barrelled up from the Stove until it is sufficiently cool, & has been passed thro' a Powder Screen.

You will please to observe that if hereafter you should have any Horse Mills erected, or any New Water Mills whose Runners cannot go at the Rate of six Revolutions in a minute, as your present Mills are capable of doing, you must never think of working your charges so short a time as three Hours, but must work them in proportion to the weight of such New Runners, & the Velocity with which they move, compared with the weight & Velocity of your present Runners. I think it necessary to give you this caution - because two hours & a half the time you formerly worked your charges, was not sufficient to incorporate your Ingredients so as to make a durable grain.

Last Night in obedience to Your Commands delivered your Orders to Col: Spy — relative to the Repairs of the Royal Powder Mills — at this place.

I have this day set Dospinge Mill to Work, but owing to the Slowness of the Water only two pair of Runners can Work.

The inclosed Report of the Respective Officers will inform Your Grace how long it will be before the Horse Mills can be set to Work upon Gunpowder, & how much Powder can then be Worked in a day from which Statement Your Grace will be able to judge of the expediency of setting the Merchants Mills to work to provide Supplies for the Demands which may be made in case of a War.

I beg leave to suggest to Your Grace the necessity there may be for having all the Ammunition & Laboratory Stores examined which are at Portsmouth, by the Chief Firemaster of the Royal Laboratory, as that Nature of Stores which belongs to the Proportion of Ordnance in the Battering Train Store house, certainly by this time stand in need of airing at least.

We humbly beg leave to acquaint you that this morning at 5 o'clock - N^o. 1 Lower Flare Mill blew up just at the instant the Charge had worked its full time & the Millman was about to take it from off the Bedstone - but it providentially did no other damage than blowing off the Roof of the Mill.

The Cause of this Accident was the Horses starting forward after the Millman had collected the Charge in readiness to take it off the Bedstone; by which means the Runners came in Contact and occasioned the Explosion.

In order to prevent a similar Accident we have directed the Millmen in future to loose the Horses Traces from the Mills at the time of Unloading.

We have in order to prevent His Majestys Service from suffering any Delay, requested the Commanding Royal Engineer to repair the small Damage the above Mill has sustained from this Explosion - which we humbly hope will meet your Approbation.

We beg leave to acquaint you that this morning about 5 o'clock A.M. & a pair of Runners at Horse and Cart mill blew up a few minutes before the usual time of unloading them, which were at work on Cylinder Charcoal, by which accident the mill has received considerable damage being totally unroofed and the sides and ends of that part of the Mill blown out, but providentially the millman escaped with no further injury than a slight contusion on his leg by the fall of a Plank, we imagine it was occasioned from the Snuff being blown over the leaden Cistern in which the Lamp stands by the violence of the wind as on examining the mill a hole was discovered in the bottom of the place that contains the lamp burnt quite through, — The Clerk of the works will repair the damage as soon as possible and in order to prevent the like happening again we purpose to have the places which contain the lamps lined entirely with lead, — We further beg to acquaint you that we have as is usual advised the Home Board of the above Circumstance and the steps we intend taking in Consequence.

We most respectfully beg leave to inform your Grace & the Honble Board that this morning about 5 o'clock No 3 & 4 pairs of Runners at horse and Cart mill blew up a few minutes previous to the usual time of taking off the charges, by which accident the Mill has received considerable damage, but the millman escaped with no further Injury than a slight bruise on his Leg by the fall of a Plank. Upon examining the mill after the explosion we discovered a hole in the Bottom of the place that contains the Lamp, burnt through; which leads us to think, it was occasioned by the snuff thereof being blown over the leaden Cistern in which the Lamp stands, by the violence of the wind.

We have therefore thought proper to request the Clerk of the works to repair the mill to prevent the service being retarded as little as possible, and in order to avoid a similar accident in future, the places wherein the lamps stand, to lighten the mills, will be lined entirely at the bottom with lead which we humbly hope will meet your approbation.
