The Barges

Subsequent to the closure of the RGPF a number of the barges were sold. It is believed that a number were used by on the River Lea Navigation as maintainance barges and may have survived into the 1970s. Three were sold to the Great Western Railway in 1946 for use on the Kennet and Avon Canal. One of the barges had a curved roof as is found on the surviving barges on site. The other two barges were larger each with a transom stern end and a squarer cabin that ran the full length of the boat. Mr Gould of newbury who late rowned one of the barges commented that they were unusual canal boats owing to the lack of internal planking, which made caulking difficult.

The smaller barge was bought by Mr Gould in the early 1950s and was used an office for a boat hire business on the Kennet and Avon canal. The barge survived into the 1960s when it was broken up. One of the larger barges remained derelict for some time and was broken up probably during the 1950s. The other barge was sunk up stream from ewbury Wharf in around eight feet of water and is believed to survive.


