F., it becomes necessary to consider the umber of nclosures appointment of a Lady Superintendent. in each. I am now interviewing candidates for a similar position at the R. S. A. F. and I should be plad of authority to select one of them for the Waltham appointment, for your approval. The salary at R. S. A. F. is to be £850 per anomm, and I recommend 1916. a similar salary at R. C. P. F. I am anxious to get the appointment at R. G. P. P. made and confirmed as early as possible, because the selected person should have some little time to study the methods employed at Woolwich and elsewhere, to ensure the welfare of the women, and because there are a great many details to be threshed out on the spot, which should be all cut and dried before women commence work. I understand also that there is some competition for Lady Superintendents of a desirable type in Munitions Factories, and it is desirable to secure such suitable women while they are to be got. Dear Colonel Fisher,

I write to place my resignation as Lady Superintendent of the women at the Royal Gunpowder Factory in your hands.

I have now held the post for two months; and the actual number of women working is only 40, and I undestand that there is no possibility of any large increase in numbers.

As you are aware, there is in the Factory no accommodation suitable for the work which I understand that I am expected to carry out, and I feel that I can no longer agree to continue under the present unsatisfactory conditions, also that I am serving no useful purpose by remarking in the Factory.

I assume that my notice will take effect one month from the date of your reception of this letter, but I should like to add I should be glad to be set free at the earliest moment that will suit your convenient

Dear Colonel Fisher,

I must ask you kindly to accept my letter of 25th May as containing my final decision, I should not have sent it had it not been a considered decision. I much regret that you should regard it as a bolt from the blue, I choose this time for making my resignation as less inconvenient from the point of view of the Factory. I understand that the present situation was unforeseen, but I should like to point out that on the occasion of my appointment I was given to understand that it was urgently necessary I should take up my duties as soon as possible.

May I more particularly emphasise the fact that I referred to in my letter of the 25th that there is no suitable accommodation for the work I am expected to undertake? It does not seem to me satisfactory that I should have been asked to take up the work before any accommodation at all in the Factory was ready or, even when, as now, the best that offers is the Women's Shifting Room. For me to undertake more work under these conditions would be difficult even if it offerwed itself, and cannot agree to continue to hold the appointment.

You will recollect that in February of this year you were good enough to select Miss Hilds Walton of Somer-ville College. Oxford to fill the post of Lady Superintendant at the Royal Gunpowder Factory, Waltham Abbey. This lady has now tendered her resignation, and Colonel Fisher, after once suggesting that she should withdraw her notice, has accepted it.

hiss Walton's reasons for resigning seem to be based on the fact that she had more or less taken up the position not knowing the real facts of the case. She complains that there are only 40 women at present working. The increase in the number of women employed at Waltham abbey has been unexpectedly checked by unforseen circumstances, but the combing out of eligible men, and the probable resumption of full output together with the starting up of the last ordered extension will involve the engagement of a considerable number of women.

Mr. McDougall Duokham would be much obliged if you could let him hear whether you know of any lady who would be suitable to fill this poet.

Miss Hilds Walton, Ledy Superintendent, Royal Gunpowder Factory, has tendered her resignation of her appointment, and as I have no option in the matter, I have, after once suggesting that she should withdraw her notice, accepted it.

The alleged reasons for her action are given in the two letters attached. I do not think that they are in any way convincing, as Miss Walton was fully conversant with the facts of the case when she took up her duties.

I am of opinion that she has not given the actual cause for wishing to leave, and I think that in the event of her attempting to secure any other employment under the Ministry, a close investigation should be made.

Meanwhile, I shall be glad if another Lady Superintendent can be selected to commence her work not later than the 25th June next.

As you are sware the increase in the number of women employed at Waltham Abbey has been unexpectedly checked, by unforeseen circumstances, but the combing out of eligible men, and the probable resumption of full output together with the starting up of the last ordered extension will involve the engagement of a considerable number.
