THE FAMILY OF SAMUEL ROBERT BERRY

Samuel Robert Berry was one of twelve children born to James Edward and Sarah Berry; there were ten boys and two girls. The parents with their developing family appear in the Waltham Abbey census records for 1881, 1891 and 2001. There was opposition to the gathering of census information, and some people were un-cooperative. In particular people were reluctant to give their place of birth for fear of being sent back there if they became poor. Mistakes could easily be made by the enumerator in copying from his notes to the printed forms, also the writing of the enumerator is often very scrappy. The Berrys added to the difficulty of interpretation by seemingly not giving their proper ages and by the casual use of either first or second Christian name. Also they did not always appear to have their children baptised, and when they did, they sometimes delayed the baptism and had a multiple ceremony, but fortunately, at this time, the date of birth was given. The relevant census records need to be studied with care to ensure we are dealing with the same family. The records are:

There seems enough consistency in the names and ages of the children to accept that these records are of the same family, and that the father, James Edward Berry, is the same man as Edward Berry. A child recorded as aged 10 in 1881 ought to have been born in 1870 or 1871; inconsistency from decade to decade should be no more than 1 year, depending on whether a birthday fell just before of just after the enumeration day. We see here one pretty obvious mistake, the names of Alfred and Arthur apparantly being transposed in 1891; it is Arthur who should be aged 13 in 1891, he was aged 3 in 1881 and 23 in 1901. As for the ages of the parents, perhaps they were just not sure of their

proper age. We see here examples of the variation in the use of names; 'Anne R' of 1891 was baptised 'Annie Rosina', whereas in 1901 she is listed as 'Rose'; also we note that Samuel R in 1891 becomes Robert in 1901. Therefore it is easier to accept that James Edward of 1881 should be the same as Edward of 1891 and 1901.

From the three sources above, the father should have been born in 1852-53, in 1849-50 or in 1851-52 respectively; thus the overall range for his birth, from this rather confused evidence, is 1849-53. There is no suitable baptism for him in the Waltham parish registers; however the children were baptised as follows:

This appears to be a convincing record of the family of James Edward and Sarah, with the first name James omitted at the baptism of the twins Henry James and Ernest Charles, as it was in the two latter census records. The family lived first in Highbridge Street by 1872, and, by 1881, in Romeland. Two children died in infancy. Although both parents claimed to be born in Waltham Abbey, there seems to be no record of their marriage here, which would be expected in 1871 or just before.

We have reasoned that James Edward, or just Edward Berry, should have been born in the years 1849-53. Although we cannot find his baptism, we appear to see him as a boy, living with his parents William and Caroline, in the census records for 1851 and 1861, see below:

It has to be said that the name Berry, in 1851, is so badly written that Perry would have been read, had not the names and ages of the parents and two children been consistent with the 1861 record below; perhaps we should see this as another mistake by the enumerator or as an example of his dreadful handwriting. We note that Edward was aged 8 months when the 1851 census was taken on 30 March. Thus he was born by 30 July 1850. This falls within the range 1849-53 already postulated for the birth of James Edward Berry. We therefore suspect that this baby Edward is in fact the James Edward who married Sarah. Then by 1861 we see the birth of his brothers and sisters. We note the use of the same Christian names, particularly the more unusual ones of Rosina and Ernest, for the children as used by James Edward and Sarah:

Here, Caroline seems to feel it is safe to give her proper place of birth. This family are not present in the 1871 census, the family seem to have moved away, outside the parish. However the parents and one son do appear in 1881 when most of the children have left the nest, by which time James Edward Berry has married and is starting to raise his family:

The 1861 record is the first intimation that William Berry worked in the Royal Gunpowder Works. In a list of persons employed in the government works in 1855, W. Berry is one of 11 granulating house men (Winters 1887, 112); William would then have been aged about 34.

For some reason we do not find the baptism of any of the above children at Waltham Abbey, although their first child Caroline Bury was baptised here on 6 December 1846 and was buried a week later on the 13th. But the marriage did take place in the parish church at Waltham, on 30 March 1845; this was between William Berry, aged 20, a laborer in the Gunpowder Mills, of Fountain Place, whose father was James Berry, a brewer, to Caroline Brown, of Sewardstone Street, whose father was Robert Brown, a boot maker. We find that William Berry, born on 26 February 1823, was baptised on 18 May; his parents being James and Rachael Berry, the father being a Laborer of Greenyard.

One might hope to find the baptisms, and possibly the marriages too, in the IGI (International Genealogical Index) records for Essex. But the later registers for Waltham Abbey seem not to have been accessed for these records, and anyway several children were not baptised here, if at all. Sometimes in lieu of the register records, some family data may be included instead in the IGI. This happens in this case where a 'relative', Isabella R Crafts, is the source for the birth at Waltham Abbey, of six of the Berry clan:

It is worth comparing the above 'family data', which is often inaccurate, with what we can from the parish registers. Three direct comparisons can be made. Only the date of birth of Henry James Bury is identical. That of William Berry shows a difference of three days. That of Albert Berry is almost a year out. For James Edward Berry we reason he was born by 30 July 1850, so again there is a difference of about a year; however we are particularly pleased his name included in this data. Who the 'relative' Isabella R Crafts, or Mr Berry or Mrs Beatrice Emma Berry, might be, is not presently known; but the feeling must be that this group is a closely connected one and that Isabella was quite good at remembering

birthdays but was not accurate with her relation's ages. We may dare to conclude that James Edward Berry was born on 23 July 1850 rather than 1851.

At the time of writing, Waltham burials have been indexed to 1878, and baptisms and marriages only to 1812. Thus it is tedious to be sure of finding later data other than by scrolling through microfiche. However another useful source is the Waltham Abbey Church Monthly; this has been indexed from November 1889 to November 1906. The following 19 Berry entries are found, including the marriage of the first four of the surviving sons of James Edward and Sarah Berry, and some of their first children. We might guess that Beatrice Emma was the wife of one of the other sons. The entries are augmented here by additional information in brackets from the baptismal records (B = born; b = baptism; m = marriage; d = death):

Here we learn of the marriage of four sons of James Edward and Sarah, the elder brothers of Samuel Robert Berry; of Edward William to Jessie; of Henry James to Edith Maud Attwood of Galley Hill; of Arthur to Edith May Hurren of Waltham Cross; and of Alfred George to Ellen Tarling of Highbridge Street. We learn of the birth of six children to these couples. We learn of the baptism of the last four children of James Edward and Sarah. We come across two couples who may not be part of this Berry family; of Henry and Samuel Francis who seems to have married twice.

The marriage of Samuel Robert Berry to Sarah Sambridge we learn from the writings of their daughter Enid Rosemary; there may be more records of this branch of the family in the later registers and in the later issues of the Church Monthly. The Poor Rate books survive for Waltham from 1840 to 1900 at the decade intervals. The occupants of property paid the rate and the overseers, who collected the monies, would have trod an established path around their districts; thus it is often possible to work out roughly where a particular family lived. From the 1860 book, William Bury leased a £4½ rental value House and Garden from the Board of Ordnance, property 264, on the north side of Highbridge Street. We have discussed above, from the 1861 census that this is William and Caroline Berry; we reasoned too that we recognised them in the 1851 census. In the 1850 Poor Rate book we have just the name Bury as occupier of a similar house, entry 287, leased from the Ordnance. This house and garden ought to be one of the Ordnance properties just west of Powder Mill Lane.

We did not find the family in the 1871 census. In the 1870 Poor Rate book we find only the name 'Berry' in property 63, occupying a tenement and yard, belonging to George Coxshall, on the east side of Sewardstone Street. It seems likely this is Samuel Berry who also worked item 421, a government allotment in Edmonsea, one of 111 such pieces of 'garden ground'; this man is not one of the immediate family we have been discussing. The name of William Berry is not one of the allotment holders in this list. We conclude that between 1861 and 1870 William and Caroline and their children had moved out of the parish. By 1872 their son James Edward, or just Edward, had married and returned here for the baptism of his first child, Edward William, in November of that year.

In the 1881 census both William and his son James Edward were living in Romeland. The son having moved there in late 1876 or 1877 from the baptism of his children. It is a mystery therefore why the name of James Edward does not appear in the 1880 Poor Rate book; William is not there either, so perhaps came back to Waltham in late 1880 or early 1881. It is just possible tht James Edward was living in a Romeland property where the name of the occupied was not given.

In the 1890 Poor Rate book, we find James Edward was living in a Cottage with Garden on the east side of Romeland, which was owned by William Gardener. In 1900 James Edward leased probably the same Cottage which was then called No.30 Romeland.

In the census returns we see, in 1891, that Samuel Robert Berry was 3 years old, and in 1901, when aged 13, he was called Robert. His daughter Enid Rosemary Berry Neilsen Clay, in her story "I remember…" tells that he married Sarah Sambridge. Enid was born in 1920 at 15 Woollard Street, the houses in this street, like many in Greenfield Street, and Town Mead Road, and the Victoria Villas, were all built by William Gardener in the late Victorian period. Enid tells also of her brothers Robert James Edward and Ernest William. There is more to tell of her and her brothers. Hopefully, too, Enid remembers her aunts and uncles.

BERRY FAMILY

It was good to meet you all at the Gunpowder factory. I spent a day at the Family Records Centre in Myddleton Street, Clerkenwall, and looked up the Cheshunt census records. The family of Samuel and Florence are on the enclosed sheet. Rosina Emily does not exist; it was my misreading of Florence, the F and I were joined up to look like an R and the rest followed in error. I have found one new baptism:

Samuel John 3 March 1889 (Born 19 Jan 1889, s of Samuel Francis and Florence Emily, Waltham New Town, father laborer)

I am not sure if your interest is to trace the family backwards. If so the baptism of Samuel Francis ought to be found at Suffolk Record Office, and of Florence Emily at Hertford Record Office; would Dorothy like to follow her up at Hertford Record Office? I could introduce her there.

Also you mentioned the Rudd family. I forget how they are connected, plese remind me. There are 3 Rudd baptisms I happened to come across:

I see in the two census records of 1891 and 1901 that Samuel Francis was a 'laborer' and a 'hand'. At the baptism of Frank Arthur in 1892 he was a foreman; at the baptism of Florence Emily in 1894 he

was again a laborer. I can't find baptisms of Arthur, Clara or Harold. I wonder what to make of this. In 1892 he would have been aged 28, just old enough to be a foreman. What do you think? Did you believe he was a foreman, if so why? Do you think there could have been confusion with Samuel Berry of Enfield; see 1891 census, living at Waltham Lane.

I include a tree of the other Berry family. Since your Samuel Francis came from Bury St Edmunds, it looks likely that there may be no connection between the families. I wonder if you would like to write up everything you know about your family, saying where the information comes from, and what you hope to find out.

The latter Florence aged 6 was the girl baptised as Florence Emily when her mother's name was wrongly read as Rosina Emily, it is now read as Florence Emily. So, although living in the parish of Cheshunt, the first four children were baptised at Waltham Abbey, being the nearest church; the baptisms of Arthur and Clara have not been found.

We need the baptism of Samuel Francis Berry at Bury St Edmunds, which should have been in 1863 or 1864. Since we know the mother as Florence Emily, who should have been born in 1863 or 1864 at Hertford or Ware, we ought to be able to establish her surname; also her marriage there possibly in 1898 or before.



Thank you for your enquiry of 8 January 2007 about a member of the staff of the Royal Gunpowder Factory, Waltham Abbey.

I have not been able to find any records that mention Edward James Berry by name, but there is one sentence in the Annual Report of the Royal Gunpowder Factory for 1903-1904 (National Archives document reference SUPP 28/315) saying that seven men left that year on transfer to the Indian Cordite Factory. There is nothing to indicate whether they went together or at different times. Nor is there any reason given for their transfer. However, I have found a website with some information about the cordite factory at Aruvankadu and it seems that the factory opened in January 1904. It is very likely that the men were recruited from the Royal Gunpowder Factory to bring their expertise to the new factory.
