On entering building L149 visitors will be greeted by Mr H.A. Dunwoody, the well-known G.O.A., in morning dress, and wearing a sash displaying a prominent Union Jack. Mr Dunwoody, with his pleasant, easy-going manner, will make our visitors feel at home.

Passing through the ante-room with its unique collection of photographic journals displayed on shelves, visitors enter room 14, where the ~~for~~ whole panorama of S.C. tests spreads itself before their eyes.
