A CHRISTMAS TALE

Christmas is traditionally a time for remembering and at this time I think back to how I spent one particular Christmas Day when I was full time water warden. Ron Kerr and I worked 24 hour shifts, handing over at 8 am each day. On the Christmas in question I took over and, after breakfast had a leisurely cycle ride around North Site checking Water Ways Cottage gate, along the river bank to Newton's Poolboth gates were already open - on to Fisher's Green point, down to Edmonsey Weir, then through the factory, down to Lower Island Weir - unlocking and relocking three sets of security gates on the way, then home.

I had just started my Christmas Lunch with my family, plus mother-in-law, when the phone rang - message from King Weir "taken up two gates". That meant I should have to go out and take up the equivalent of two gates to release the flood water through the factory site. When I went up to Edmonsey Weir, water was already coming over the banks. I had to winch up the gate by turning a heavy iron handle 285 turns, then a quick cycle ride down to Lower Island Weir to let the water past out of our level. Again it was a heavy iron handle with 250 turns to get the gate up. I cycled home sweating and somewhat exhausted, only to hear the wife say "Kings Weir have taken up two more gates", so, it was out again up to Edmonsey, another 285 turns, back to Lower Island, not forgetting to unlock and re-lock three sets of gates, and another 250 turns at Lower Island - home again exhausted. During the evening another call out to lift one of the two gates at the rear of the Abbey Church then down to Lower Island to take up another gate and home again and to bed. At 3 am another call out to lift the second gate at the Abbey Church and another visit to Lower Island. While I was out I decided to cycle all round North Site to see if all was well and found a large raft of rubbish in the gates at Newton's Pool which had to be cleared. I just got started when the bulb blew in the overhead light so had to finish the job in the dark which was a bit risky. Home again at 5.30 am, cup of tea and back to bed. 7 am another call but, as all our gates were up could do no more. On Boxing Day, Ron Kerr had no calls out at all but the day after I had, during my 24 hour shift, to put down nearly all of the gates again as the flood levels dropped. As I said at the beginning of this tale, a Christmas I shall never forget!

In the event it was really hissing down and only 5 brave souls actually turned up with an immediate adjournment to Red's Diner (formerly Emie Perry's Office) for coffee.

We then drove to M343 - how lazy I hear you say, but we had only 2 umbrellas between us and didn't want to appear at the Reunion soaking wet! M343 was padlocked so we wandered up to N549 'Wet Mix' to look at Charlie Stacey's memorial tree (planted in 1977). We then went on to N549. We then wandered back towards the cars via the "Box and Tray Store' which was open and still harbours many interesting items; such as leather Satchels for explosive samples, Cordite Boxes and a number of unrecognisable (to us) bits of apparatus. 

We would have liked to have met Lynn again and had an opportunity to visit P708 to view and identify the various artefacts that Steve Chaddock has assembled there but time did not allow.


As the title above suggests, this may well have been the last chance to visit South Site as Lynn expects the site to be sold to developers within the year.




You may remember that Freda Titford produced some paintings of the North Site which were displayed in the Abbey museum at the start of the year. Unfortunately this wonderful collection of paintings was dispersed to the four winds as eager buyers snapped them up as mementoes of the old days. We were, however, fortunate in that a number of these were kindly brought to the Reunion by their owners for a mini display.

Once again the caterers did a superb job, but that obviously has an impact on the cost which had to be increased this year. Still, it didn't seem to put many people off and I believe that the bar also did quite well!

Being aware of some comments earlier in the year regarding the slow progress on the future of the North Site we invited along the Chairman of the Steering Committee, Don Spinks, to bring us up to date on the current situation. He was accompanied by Liz Webster, local councillor, who also has a strong interest in the site development.

Don gave us the full history of the negotiations that have been taking place and expressed the intentions and views of the Steering Committee as to the establishment of the museum. He explained that nothing could be done until the result of the bid for Lottery Funds was known but that this decision was imminent and that he was very confident of success. He also praised the Ministry of Defence for their assistance, not least the significant sum of money provided for future running of the museum site.


One last thing- does anyone have any ideas for extra 'activities' for future reunions. Displays, speakers, a quiz? Or would you all rather just drink, eat and talk!



NORTH SITE NEWS

£6,500,000 !!!

Yes! £6.5 million pounds has been secured from the Heritage Lottery Fund for the development of North Site as a National Explosives Museum. English heritage regards it as the most important site of its kind in Europe, if not the world. A large part of the site is classified as a Site of Special scientific interest with the highest conservation listing as an Ancient monument with 21 listed buildings (but we knew that anyway).

This money is the start of an estimated £14.8 million development that is expected to take 3 years to complete. A further £2.8 million is expected from private sector investment and the MoD has provided an endowment fund of £5.5 million. The endowment is money held in trust as a capital investment and the interest on this will provide the future running expenses of the museum site.

This is the news that we have all been waiting for and which was hinted at by Don Spinks in his talk at the recent Reunion. It has been said, many times, that it will be important to involve local people and especially those who worked at the Establishment and we have been told that there will be opportunities for us all to have some input into the project. A call for volunteers is likely.

Touchpaper will keep you informed of developments and our register of members has been identified as an valuable resource for the future - although not too distant since we are all getting older!

SOUTH SITE NEWS

Not such a happy tale here! There is still so much uncertainty over the future of the South Site with apparent conflict between the developers and the local council.

The situation is getting very political and there is still much concern over decontamination. How much is necessary, how will it be carried out and, of course, how much will it cost.

Although the South Site has a shorter history than the North it is still contains many important features and historical aspects. It is heartening to know that at least a number of artefacts are being preserved for inclusion in the North Site development.

It isn't easy to find out exactly what is being planned or negotiated but we will continue to bring you any news and developments we hear.
